<u>Infant Activity:</u> Letter Dd exploration to build sensory development in infants.



#### Activity Procedures:


Have your child count the dots on each of the dominos on the printables sheet. Using real dominos have them match the same amounts to the pictures on the sheet.

The child can count dots from 1-10.

The child can match same shown amounts.



#### Milestones:

Child builds early reading readiness through word recognition and beginning letters

The child builds fine-motor skills through tracing letters

The child begins to recognize letter Dd



Go through this word list with your child. Write out each of the words individually on strips of white paper.

How to Teach: Spell out each word together, point to the letters as you do so (have child point with you), and after it is spelled out, have child repeat and say the full word out loud. You can draw a small picture of the larger words (nouns) next to the word written out to help with reading skills and recognition.

### Infant Activity

#### **Materials needed:**

Dolls (babies, stuffed animals, plastic dolls)

#### What to teach:

Sit with your child on the floor with the dolls.

Teach your child what "being nice means" by modeling how to treat the dolls. Give it a hug, a kiss, a high-five, talk nice to it, and rock it like a real baby doll. Build language in your infant by talking to the baby doll as if you were talking to your own child.

Character development in doll pretend free-play Exploring manners and modeling good behavior Life-skills (pretend play)
