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Extension Activities and Resources

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Tuesday: Complete the letter Ee activity

Activity Procedures:

Using plastic colored Easter eggs, mix and match the colors with your child. Help build their fine-motor skills by taking the eggs apart and putting them back together with same colors matching together. Count eggs from 1-10.

Milestones:

The child can open and close an egg.

The child can match same colors together.

The child can count from 1 to 10 on own.

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Wednesday: Read the eStorybook letter Ee with/to your child

* Print and read it to your child, OR have your child sit in your lap and read it with you from the computer screen

Child builds early reading readiness through storytelling and picture-word association

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Thursday: Explore letter Ee objects.

How to Teach: Discuss each of these objects in detail, describing them to your child, saying the name of it and asking your child to tell you what letter it starts with.

Milestones:

Milestones:

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Go through this word list with your child. Write out each of the words individually on strips of white paper.

How to Teach: Spell out each word together, point to the letters as you do so (have child point with you), and after it is spelled out, have child repeat and say the full word out loud. You can draw a small picture of the larger words (nouns) next to the word written out to help with reading skills and recognition.

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Infant Activity

Materials needed:

Plastic Easter eggs

What to teach:

Have your infant sit in their highchair. Place a few Easter eggs on their tray. Show and model to them how they open and close (saying the words to teach language), talk about their colors (saying the colors names while showing it), and encourage your infant to grab an egg to pick up. Help their hands to open and close the eggs together. Watch to see if they begin trying on their own.
