Extension Activities and Resources

<u>Infant Activity:</u> Letter Hh exploration to build sensory development in infants.



Tuesday: Complete the letter Hh activity

Activity Procedures:

Talk about your home with your child today.

Walk around and have your child tell you what each room is called, and what you do there. Such as, the bathroom, where you take a bath and go potty.

On a white sheet of paper, have your child draw their home.

Milestones:

The child can (attempts to) draw a picture.

The child can name places they recognize.

Wednesday: Read the eStorybook letter Hh with/to your child

* Print and read it to your child, OR have your child sit in your lap and read it with you from the computer screen.

Milestones:

Child builds early reading readiness through storytelling and picture-word association
Child builds language and letter awareness
Child builds listening skills

Thursday: Explore letter Hh objects.

How to Teach: Discuss each of these objects in detail, describing them to your child, saying the name of it and asking your child to tell you what letter it starts with.

Milestones:

Child uses senses to explore "Hh" objects
Child builds comprehension skills
Child builds letter-sound awareness through
words that begin with that letter

You can choose any or all of the objects listed below to explore and teach your child. If you have other objects around your home that begin with the letter Hh, use them to explore and teach your child with.



Milestones:

Child builds early reading readiness through word recognition and beginning letters

The child builds fine-motor skills through tracing letters

The child begins to recognize letter Hh



Go through this word list with your child. Write out each of the words individually on strips of white paper.

How to Teach: Spell out each word together, point to the letters as you do so (have child point with you), and after it is spelled out, have child repeat and say the full word out loud. You can draw a small picture of the larger words (nouns) next to the word written out to help with reading skills and recognition.

Infant Activity

Materials needed:

Hard items (I.E. hard book, large rock, hard toy, canned food or baby food jars, and hard large ball)

What to teach:

Place the hard items on the floor in front of your infant. Allow them to explore with those items on their own. This is how they learn. Teach the concept of hard by explaining how each object feels, and what the name of each object is.

Milestones to meet:

Concept of hard

Language development (word-associations)

Discovery and exploration of everyday items
