Extension Activities and Resources

<u>Infant Activity:</u> Letter Kk exploration to build sensory development in infants.



<u>Tuesday</u>: Complete the letter Kk activity

<u>Activity Procedures:</u>

The activity today is going to involve keys and key holes. Let your child practice putting your house key in the door key holes. For "trial and error" learning, have them put the keys in the car keyholes. Did it work? Which keys fit in those key holes? Buy some locks with keys at any story (Lowes, Home Depot, Wal-mart) and have your child practice putting the keys in, locking the lock, and unlocking it again with the key.

Milestones:

The child can use fine-motor skills to put keys in holes and unlock.

Wednesday: Read the eStorybook letter Kk with/to your child

* Print and read it to your child, OR have your child sit in your lap and read it with you from the computer screen

Milestones:

Child builds early reading readiness through storytelling and picture-word association
Child builds language and letter awareness

Thursday: Explore letter Kk objects.

How to Teach: Discuss each of these objects in detail, describing them to your child, saying the name of it and asking your child to tell you what letter it starts with.



Milestones:

Child builds early reading readiness through word recognition and beginning letters

The child builds fine-motor skills through tracing letters

The child begins to recognize letter Kk



Go through this word list with your child. Write out each of the words individually on strips of white paper.

How to Teach: Spell out each word together, point to the letters as you do so (have child point with you), and after it is spelled out, have child repeat and say the full word out loud. You can draw a small picture of the larger words (nouns) next to the word written out to help with reading skills and recognition.

Infant Activity

Materials needed:

Keys

What to teach:

Sit with your infant on the floor. Hold up keys in front of them. Dangle them, shake them, and rattle them to make noises. Encourage your infant to grab at them. They will definitely want to put them in their mouth so make sure to rinse them off first! Allow them to learn and discover using their senses of touch, taste, hearing, and sight.
