Extension Activities and Resources

Infant Activity: Letter LI exploration to build sensory development in infants.


Monday: Complete the "Art food sensory" letter activity; let your child glue lima beans onto the letter LI printable sheet

<u>Tuesday</u>: Complete the letter LI activity

<u>Activity Procedures:</u>

Find leaves outside with your child. Take them inside and one at a time, put a leaf under a sheet of white paper. Have your child use a crayon or marker to color over the paper where the leaf is, making "leaf print rubbings". You can also build math skills by sorting and grouping leaves by similar or different characteristics.

Milestones:

The child uses fine-motor skills to color.

The child sorts like & unlike characteristics.

Wednesday: Read the eStorybook letter Ll with/to your child

* Print and read it to your child, OR have your child sit in your lap and read it with you from the computer screen

Child builds early reading readiness through storytelling and picture-word association
Child builds language and letter awareness

Thursday: Explore letter LI objects.

How to Teach: Discuss each of these objects in detail, describing them to your child, saying the name of it and asking your child to tell you what letter it starts with.

Friday: Complete the letter LI word list and tracer page.



Milestones:

Child builds early reading readiness through word recognition and beginning letters

The child builds fine-motor skills through tracing letters

The child begins to recognize letter Ll



Go through this word list with your child. Write out each of the words individually on strips of white paper.

How to Teach: Spell out each word together, point to the letters as you do so (have child point with you), and after it is spelled out, have child repeat and say the full word out loud. You can draw a small picture of the larger words (nouns) next to the word written out to help with reading skills and recognition.

Letter of the week "Ll" Infant Activity

Materials needed:

Laces from shoes

What to teach:

Place the laces on the floor or highchair tray in front of your infant. Encourage child to build handeye coordination by grabbing at the lace strings. Hold the lace strings up high and watch as your infant will reach up to grab it. Move it from one side to the other, and watch to see if your infant will follow the lace string with their eyes from side-to-side. Let child explore laces in order to learn.
