## Weekly Lessons & Activities

Monday: Complete the "Art food sensory" letter activity; let your child use oil as a form of "glue" (use a paintbrush to smear on the oil first) and put the oats on the letter Oo printable sheet.

Tuesday: Complete the letter Oo activity

Wednesday: Read the eStorybook letter Oo with/to your child

Thursday: Explore letter Oo objects

Friday: Complete the letter Oo word list and tracer page

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## Extension Activities and Resources

Assessment Rubric: At the end of every letter unit. For parents to keep track of their child's learning for each activity completed. This is an easy way to manage the skills they have mastered, and those they need to continue to work on with their parent.

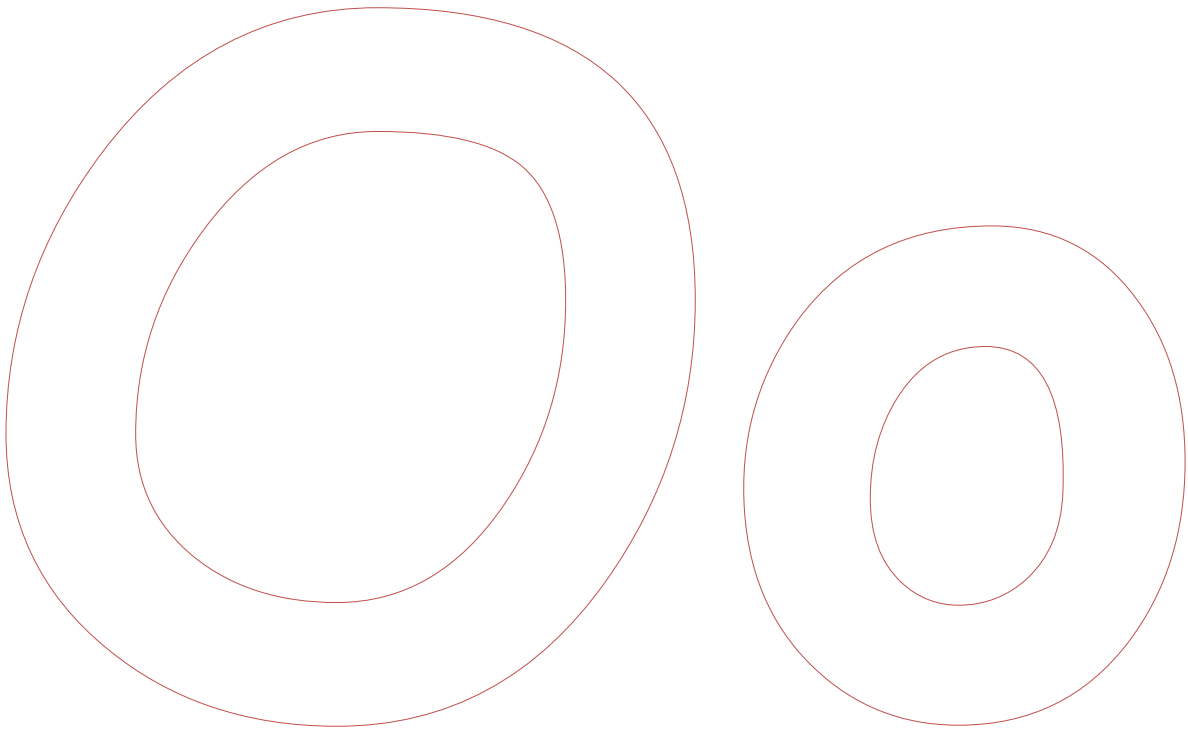

Tuesday: Complete the letter Oo activity

## Activity Procedures:

Using the opposite printable cards below, lay them out face up on a table or the floor in front of your child. Help them match the opposite picture cards together. Ask child "why those go together?" Explain reasoning behind it if they're unsure.

# Letter of the week "Oo"

Go through this word list with your child. Write out each of the words individually on strips of white paper.

How to Teach: Spell out each word together, point to the letters as you do so (have child point with you), and after it is spelled out, have child repeat and say the full word out loud. You can draw a small picture of the larger words (nouns) next to the word written out to help with reading skills and recognition.

# Letter of the week "Oo"

## Infant Activity

### Materials needed:

"O" shapes (things that are all round—circles)

### What to teach:

Place the circle objects on the floor in front of your infant. Let them discover and learn with them freely on their own. Discuss and teach about each of their shapes (circles) and how they can also be the letter Oo. Hold objects up one at a time to teach. Build early language development through discussion of these objects that are circle.
