<u>Infant Activity</u>: Letter Vv exploration to build sensory development in infants.



V is for <u>Vanilla Pudding</u>.

<u>Tuesday</u>: Complete the letter Vv activity <u>Activity Procedures:</u>

The activity today will require you and your child using your VOICE! Sing children's songs together such as ABC's, Twinkle Twinkle, Itsy Bitsy Spider, Row Row Row Your Boat, 10 Little Indians, and If You're Happy & You Know It. Do the actions that go along with your child. Then, ask your child what kinds of different tones you can make with your voice? Loud, quiet, whisper, stutter, mumble, & regular talking. Try it!

Milestones:

The child builds language development through songs, rhymes, and movement.

Wednesday: Read the eStorybook letter Vv with/to your child

* Print and read it to your child, OR have your child sit in your lap and read it with you from the computer screen

Thursday: Explore letter Vv objects.

How to Teach: Discuss each of these objects in detail, describing them to your child, saying the name of it and asking your child to tell you what letter it starts with.



Milestones:

Child builds early reading readiness through word recognition and beginning letters

The child builds fine-motor skills through tracing letters

The child begins to recognize letter Vv



Go through this word list with your child. Write out each of the words individually on strips of white paper.

How to Teach: Spell out each word together, point to the letters as you do so (have child point with you), and after it is spelled out, have child repeat and say the full word out loud. You can draw a small picture of the larger words (nouns) next to the word written out to help with reading skills and recognition.

Infant Activity

Materials needed:

Shoes with Velcro (or pieces of Velcro if you do not have any shoes with them at your house)

What to teach:

Sit with your infant on the floor. Place the Velcro shoes in front of them. Model and show your infant, teaching how to open and close the Velcro. Say the words "open and close" as you do the actions. Repeat that process showing your infant about 5 times. Encourage them to grab at the Velcro to either open it, or close it after you.

Concept of open and close
